The Epistles #1

Pauline Letters

The Epistles or Letters are directed to a person or a group of people. The letters attributed to Paul as the writer are called the Pauline Letters. There are a total number of 13 Pauline Letters broken into two sections. One section is generally referred to as the Pauline Epistles while the second section is called the Pastoral Epistles.

The first group of Pauline Letters includes 10 books. They are as follows:

- Romans
- 1 Corinthians
- **2** Corinthians
- Galatians
- Ephesians
- Philippians
- Colossians
- 1 Thessalonians
- 2 Thessalonians
- Philemon

How to remember this section:

- Romans this book written by Paul to the church in Rome has a primary theme of God's plan of salvation and righteousness for ALL mankind. The need for salvation for both Jew and Gentile are stated by Paul and can only be achieved through the redemptive work of Jesus Christ and can only be received by faith. This principle of faith is shown previously through Abraham being granted righteousness through his faith in the Lord. Paul moves on to show how a believer is freed from sin, law, and death.
- 1 Corinthians concerns about immoral practices were at the heart of letters to the church in Corinth and are very relevant to the church especially today. Pursuit of sanctification and holiness of character are paramount to Paul in this letter. It is both instructional and inspirational in battling the immaturity, divisions, jealousy, envy, marital difficulties, sexual immorality, and misuse of spiritual gifts. Very relevant to the church even today.

- <u>2 Corinthians</u> more autobiographical material from Paul than any other writing. His personal feelings and character are on full display in this book. To **strive for holiness and reach for the perfection of Christ in our own lives (sincerity of character)** is of utmost importance. Integrity, a giving heart, discipline, forgiveness, and the power that comes from weakness are at the heart of the 2nd letter to the Corinthians. The reaffirmation of Paul as an apostle of Christ is given here.
- Galatians Martin Luther relied on this book most often when battling against the prevailing theology of his day. The basic message of Galatians brought about the Reformation. The important NT truth that man is justified by faith alone in the finished work of the Lord Jesus Christ, not by legalistic works or deeds. We are not bound by the legalistic or pharisaical teachings that attempt to put Christians into bondage once again. Faith in Christ brings about freedom of the Spirit, and obedience is a result of that faith manifested in the Spirit.
- Ephesians Paul wrote to the Ephesians with the intent to expand on the understanding of what a Christian is, what God's grand design is for the Believers in His Son, Jesus Christ, whom he predetermined to save and whom He would damn, and how He would disperse His gifts to the elect through the Holy Spirit. Emphasis on how we as reconciled individuals should live out our lives in a practical manner fulfilling God's purposes is a central theme. The ultimate goal of the church is to minister to one another promoting unity and maturity and reaching the lost. We are to display God's glory and infinite wisdom through our lives.

- Philippians It is evident that Paul wrote this book to the Philippians from confinement in prison. The primary theme is to report on his circumstances and encourage other Christians to stand firm to their beliefs in the face of persecution and not waver regardless of circumstances. To recognize those that try to bind believers to legalistic theology, is again warned of here in the Book of Philippians. This book is also known for its lack of quotes from the OT.
- <u>1 Thessalonians</u> the letters to the Thessalonians are often designated as the eschatological (doctrine of "Last Things") letters of Paul. The Second Coming permeates throughout the letter, and in this 1st letter each chapter is unique in that it is concluded with a reference to the Second Coming. Standing firm to their beliefs, living out a holy life, and making clear the understanding of the Second Coming of the Lord Jesus Christ is what is at the heart of the first letter to the Thessalonians.

- <u>2 Thessalonians</u> like its predecessor, this 2nd letter is extensively about eschatological events, or end time events. Not written long after the previous letter, it expounds on much of the same topics. Christians are to stand firm amid persecution and are to be useful being a person of integrity working hard for a living and for God. Clarifying misunderstandings about the Lord's return are very much a theme in this letter.
- Philemon this letter is placed after the Pastoral Letters in the NT. It seems to have been written about the same time as the letter to the Colossians. It is addressed to Philemon, a wealthy slave owner and fellow believer in Christ, living in Colosse. It is written on behalf of a new convert, Onesimus, a runaway slave of Philemon. A person's witness is a testimony to their faith in the Lord Jesus Christ, and it is seen by others even when it is not acknowledged immediately. Your status in heaven is not influenced by your status here on earth. Very short one chapter book.

The timeframe of these letters being penned is during the life of Paul, after his conversion to a believer in Christ described in the Book of Acts, chapter 22. These were written within a few years of Christ's death and resurrection, not centuries after. Paul being a contemporary of the apostles themselves was accepted as one himself by Jesus Christ's Apostles. His conversion is a testimony, itself.

This is the 2nd section of books in the New Testament. There are 10 books in this group totaling 54 books to this point. This is the largest group in the NT: (remember: The apostle, Paul, is responsible for 2 of the 5 sections in the NT. This is the 1st of those groups. Learn the acronym! Note as well, that the Book of Philemon is after the Pastoral Letters written by Paul.)

- 1. "For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this not from yourselves, it is the gift of God—not by works, so that no one can boast. For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do."
- **2**. "And we pray this in order that you may live a life worthy of the Lord and may please him in every way: bearing fruit in every good work, growing in the knowledge of God,"
- **3**. "Therefore no one will be declared righteous in his sight by observing the law; rather, through the law we become conscious of sin."
- **4**. "It is God's will that you should be sanctified: that you should avoid sexual immorality; that each of you should learn to control his own body in a way that is holy and honorable, not in passionate lust like the heathen, who do not know God;"
- **5**. "Examine yourselves to see whether you are in the faith; test yourselves. Do you not realize that Christ Jesus is in you—unless, of course, you fail the test?"
- **6**. "The Scripture foresaw that God would justify the Gentiles by faith, and announced the gospel in advance to Abraham: "All nations will be blessed through you."
- 7. "I pray that you may be active in sharing your faith, so that you will have a full understanding of every good thing we have in Christ."
- **8**. "No temptation has seized you except what is common to man. And God is faithful; he will not let you be tempted beyond what you can bear. But when you are tempted, he will also provide a way out so that you can stand up under it."
- **9**. "Finally, brothers, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable—if anything is excellent or praiseworthy—think about such things."
- 10. "God is just: He will pay back trouble to those who trouble you."
